#### KŪLIA ACADEMY BOARD MEMBER BIOGRAPHIES

#### DR. ROBERT BLEY-VROMAN

Robert Bley-Vroman is Professor Emeritus of Linguistics and Second Language Acquisition at the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa. Dr. Bley-Vroman's academic work concentrates on the relationship of linguistic theory to language learning. He has been a faculty member at UH for 33 years; ten years before that at the University of Texas at Austin and at the University of Michigan. At UH, he served as Department Chair, Center Director, Dean, and Chancellor at the University. He was also Director of the Intensive English Program at the the University of Michigan. As Dean of Languages, Linguistics, and Literature at UH, he had executive responsibility for a unit of seven academic departments and nearly 200 faculty members. He had responsibility for hiring, evaluating, and terminating the contracts of unionized faculty and unionized administrative staff. He was the primary decision-maker for grievances and disputes. He decided on what positions to fill, approved position descriptions, oversaw recruiting, negotiated all initial contracts, worked with the union on special salary adjustments and retention packages. He was responsible for a budget of about \$20 million. He worked with community members, the alumni association, and fund-raisers to enhance the relations between the College and the larger community.

Dr. Bley-Vroman served for two years as Chancellor of the University of Hawai'i at Mānoa, the flagship university of the University of Hawai'i System. The Chancellor is the chief executive officers, and exercises overall executive leadership over academics, student affairs, administration and budget, community relations, and research. UH Mānoa has an annual budget of over \$500 million. Dr. Bley-Vroman was responsible for leading the organization during a period of significant budgetary challenge; he was able to bring fiscal stability to Mānoa. Among his direct reports are Deans of Law and Medicine (including the UH Cancer Center), and the Director of Athletics. The Chancellor is the decision-maker for personnel decisions of faculty tenure and for grievances. Dr. Bley-Vroman represented Mānoa internationally, both in associations of other research universities, and in bilateral arrangements with specific universities, especially in Asia. The Chancellor is the chief contact with the University of Hawai'i Foundation, the fund-raising arm of the university. Dr. Bley-Vroman worked with potential donors, and with alumni and community groups, both in Hawai'i and in Asia. As head of Mānoa, Dr. Bley-Vroman worked with legislators and presented testimony at legislative hearings.

As a faculty member, Dr. Bley-Vroman served as Chair of the Mānoa Faculty Senate and also of the All-Campus Council of Faculty Senate Chairs. He is experienced in parliamentary procedure, and was responsible for revision of the Senate's charter and by-laws.

#### DR. ROBERT J. LITTMAN

Robert Littman, MLitt., PhD is a Professor of Classics at the University of Hawaii. He is a specialist in the languages, history and archaeology of the ancient world particularly in Greece and Egypt. Educated at Oxford and Columbia Universities, he has been a Fellow at the Institute for Advanced Study in Princeton. He is the author of 8 books and over 30 articles in ancient

medicine, Greek history, literature, archaeology and biblical studies. He was a member of the Egyptian Mummy Project, which investigated mummies through CT Scanning. His new projects include a study of DNA in ancient Egyptian mummies and ancient skeletal remains. He is a former Trustee of the Archaeological Institute of America. In 2017, the Archaeological Institute of America awarded him the Martha and Artemis Joukowsky Distinguished Service Award in archaeology. Currently, he is currently the Director of the Tell Timai excavation of the ancient city of Thmouis in the Nile Delta, Egypt.

He also has an extensive business career in commercial real estate development and management in Hawaii. He is the President and principal broker of Libor Realty, Ltd, which has developed and redeveloped small commercial projects, luxury houses and hotels.

He has extensive experience in non-profit educational and charitable organizations both in Hawaii and nationally. He brought his financial, fundraising and leadership skills to these organizations. Among others, he has served on the Board of Directors of Aloha United Way, and as treasurer of Congregation Sof Ma'arav, and President of Archaeological Institute of America- Hawaii, as well as president of the AODO Kalaniiki Estates. On a national level he was a Trustee of the Archaeological Institute of America, and on the Board of Directors of American Friends of Hebrew University, which awarded him the Magness Award for his fundraising and leadership contributions to the organization.

#### KAREN LEINANI AWANA

Karen Awana is a former Hawaii legislator, a well-respected member of the Native Hawaiian community and has been very active in her local and wider community. She is well-connected with the local Native Hawaiian community.

She currently works as a program specialist certifying disadvantaged business enterprises at the Office of Civil Rights of State Department of Transportation.

She was a state legislator between 2006-2014. During her tenure at the State House of Representatives, she served as the Vice Chair for National Conference of State Legislators Native American, Alaskan Indian and Native Hawaiian Caucus, a Member of National Conference of State Legislators Quad Caucus and the Chair of the Committee on International Affairs and Majority Floor Leader. Throughout her service as a state legislator, her focus has been toward improving education, streamlining transportation, addressing housing solutions, combating illegal drug use, and supporting economic revitalization.

During her work at Pacific American Foundation, she founded a national civic engagement project focusing on Asian and Pacific Island youth, mentored participants on leadership and presented initiatives before the World Indigenous Peoples Conference on Education.

Ms. Awana also brings along her expertise from her 6 years at Kamehameha Schools, a well-known and century-old non-profit private school chain for Native Hawaiian population on the islands. She was employed in in the Human Resources and the Asset Management Divisions.

Her community work and initiatives include serving as an advisory board member for Enterprise Honolulu, a board member for Habitat for Humanity, a founder of Waianae Coast Weed and Seed Initiative, board Member & vice-chair for Waianae Coast Neighborhood Board, councilmember for Nanakuli School Community Council, and Chair for Friends of the Nanakuli Public Library.

#### MURAT ADAM ARABACI


Murat Arabaci started his career as an English Teacher for English language learners. After completing his MBA, he taught college level courses as a lecturer for 3 years and worked for a CPA firm as an accountant for 4 years.

Prior to moving to Hawaii, Murat worked for New Plan Learning, a nonprofit charter school development corporation for 12 years in Chicago where he was first named as Chief Financial Officer and then Executive Director of the corporation that provided facility development and consulting services to charter schools. In this capacity, Murat was responsible for directing overall operations, business strategy, and turnkey facility development, a process that includes identifying suitable locations, performing due diligence, conducting feasibility analysis of the identified locations, hiring architectural firms and general contractors to build/renovate the school property, and arranging funding for the projects. During this time, he had the privilege of working with bond underwriters, rating agencies, commercial lenders, CDFI's - community development financial institutions - and investors, and their collective efforts with the local school boards secured financing for over 15 schools. As part of the feasibility analyses, Murat reviewed charter school budgets for underwriting purposes. As executive director, Murat was responsible for hiring and firing.


Murat is currently working towards getting his PhD degree in finance at Shidler College of Business at University of Hawai'i at Manoa.

ROBERT BLEY-VROMAN received BA from Pomona College, his MA in Germanics, and his MA and PhD in linguistics from the University of Washington. At the University of Hawai'I at Mānoa, he has served as Director of the Second Language Teaching and Curriculum Center and was the first Director of the National Foreign Language Resource Center. He was Chair of the Department of Second Language Studies from 1999–2003, Dean of the College of Languages, Linguistics, and Literature 2010–2014, and served as Chancellor of the University 2014–2016.

Before joining the faculty of the University of Hawai'i, he taught in Romania at Universitatea din Cluj (English and applied linguistics), the University of Texas at Austin (linguistics) and at the University of Michigan, where he was Director of Courses for the English Language Institute. He also served as project manager for a national project on criminal justice terminology (Federal Law Enforcement Assistance Administration).

His research is concentrated in applied linguistics, syntax, corpus linguistics, and second language acquisition theory. His theoretical work attempts to integrate current trends in linguistic theory with accounts of child/adult differences in language acquisition and to use the techniques of corpus linguistics to investigate the relationship of the statistical structure of language to second language acquisition. His research has appeared in the journals Language Learning, TESOL Quarterly, Linguistic Analysis, Linguistic Inquiry, Second Language Research, and in edited collections. His most influential papers are "The logical problem of foreign language learning" and "The comparative fallacy in interlanguage studies".

He is also interested in computational linguistics, natural language processing, corpus linguistics, and machine translation, and worked on the German-English machine translation project of Siemens AG (Project METAL), where he was responsible for the grammar used by the German parser and for aspects of the design of the programming environment.

He is also a contra dance caller and pianist for traditional music. With Randy Miller, he edited *New England Fiddler's Repertoire*, a best-selling book of traditional tunes. He is also a collector of old telephones, and ringer of tower bells at St. Andrew's cathedral, Honolulu.
