INTRODUCTION

2020 has been a year unlike any other. Our world continues to deal with a deadly pandemic. Our nation struggles with issues of social injustice and inequality. Our state suffers from one of the highest unemployment rate in the nation while we remain closed to most visitors, yet through it all, our community has demonstrated heart, resilience, and the true spirit of the HTA 'Ohana.

Despite all of the challenges that we have had to address, HTA feels poised to deliver a high-quality education while addressing the social emotional needs of our students and the safety needs of all members of our community. As such, we have adopted a temporary 80% virtual learning and 20% face-to-face instruction model. This equates to one day of face-to-face instruction per week for students. The model is a compromise based on the preferences of parents, students, and teachers, which allows us to continue with our blended model while adhering to the social distancing requirements as outlined by the CDC, Department of Health, Department of Education and Charter Commission.

As our world continues to deal with this health crisis, schools have increasingly been tasked with educating students in creative ways that not only engage them, but also ensure they are acquiring the skills and knowledge they need—all while keeping everyone within the school community safe. This is no easy feat. There is no simple fix. As always, it will be the strength of a community that defines the strength of a school, and we are blessed with a strong community, one that has demonstrated compassion and resilience in the true spirit of the HTA 'Ohana.




BLENDED LEARNING MODEL

HTA plans to return to its normal 50% virtual learning and 50% face-to-face instruction once the COVID-19 crisis has abated. HTA's model renders it uniquely prepared to operate in a virtual environment and the school is confident that the temporary 80% virtual and 20% face-to-face model will not jeopardize student learning.

This model leaves us poised to move quickly in the event of another school closure that forces a transition to 100% virtual learning.

We intend to continue Project-Based Learning through our blended learning approach, providing us the opportunity to bring students together at various field-based locations throughout the school year. This approach lets students solve real-world problems in safe and productive settings.

Virtual Learning



As we move into the 20-21 school year we will continue to work on the goals that we have addressed over the past three years:

To achieve these goals, we will continue to strengthen our projectbased learning and increase student engagement. We will also continue to provide the necessary support and resources needed to enhance teachers' virtual practices. We have a group of teachers leading us in this endeavor and providing similar expert guidance to other public and private schools in the state.

We will continue to implement high-quality instructional practices based on what students need and the progress they make. The school will provide student support, both face-to-face and virtual, offer small-group instruction, and give students opportunities to engage in real-world problem-solving.

Finally, we are making a commitment to using data to drive instruction. To help this endeavor, common assessments will be administered during the first weeks of school, mid year, and at the end of the school year. These assessments will help us understand which specific skills students need to work on.

Lincoln Empowered

This year, HTA is moving to a new learning platform for K-12, Lincoln Empowered. It will look much like our previous platform: an innovative curriculum that provides a predictable learning routine that seamlessly blends content and the best-in-class technology to create a pathway for students to own their learning. Advisory Themes

We are excited to share that we will continue enhancing our advisory curriculum. This year, advisory at the middle school level will incorporate themes of "Belonging" -- belonging to ourselves, belonging with each other, and belonging to the wider world. Advisory at the high school level will focus on themes related to "Purpose" -- what is personally meaningful, what matters outside of yourself, and stepping into life with purpose.


College and Career Counseling

We will also roll out a more robust emphasis on College and Career Counseling. Our goal is to provide students with the knowledge and skills they need to help them prepare for and navigate life after high school. Students in Grades 9-12 will be offered monthly dedicated workshops that address creating resumes, preparing for college admission, test prep, writing an effective college essay, developing a portfolio, and interviewing for a job.

Hawaii Technology Academy is an innovative learning community that empowers students to become creative, critical thinkers and enables them to determine their unique paths to success.




WORK-BASED LEARNING PROGRAM



Rules and procedures related to travel will be enhanced for students and employees. We ask all families in our community to limit unnecessary travel as much as possible. If employees or students travel outside of the State of Hawai'i for any reason, they should notify health@myhta.org and adhere to state and Department of Health guidelines. Depending on shifting state guidelines, employees or students may be required to self-quarantine for at least 14 calendar days after out-of-state travel. Visitors on Campus

HTA will limit visitors to campuses. All visitors to campus, including parents, will be screened upon arrival and must wear a face mask or face shield.

Oahu-Visitors may visit campus by appointment ONLY. Visitors will be subject to a health screening PRIOR to being admitted into the building.

Kauai- Visitors may visit campus by appointment ONLY. Visitors will be subject to a health screening PRIOR to being admitted to the building. To make an appointment, please call the Kauai campus (808)445-6618.

Maui-Visitors may visit campus by appointment ONLY. To schedule an appointment, please call our direct line (808)-445-6612 or email our Office Manager - Ms. Drayer at sdrayer@myhta.org.

Hawaii Island-To minimize the number of people on campus during face-to-face days, parents with questions about their child's progress should make appointments with classroom teachers rather than dropping by as we have always done in the past. We recognize that this is a change and continue to value the home-school relationships. We will work to find new ways to assure the sense of community that we are all used to.

PLEASE ADHERE TO THE FOLLOWING SAFETY GUIDELINES

Report COVID-19 positive test

If a student or a family member tests positive for COVID-19, the family must send an email to health@myhta.org. HTA will follow DOH protocol to follow up and inform the school community.

In the event of a positive COVID-19 test result in our community

Our health aide or designated staff will actively work with the Department of Health to implement a contact tracing protocol to limit the spread of COVID-19.

Stay home if exposed

If anyone in your household has been notified by the Department of Health that they were in contact with a COVID-19-infected individual, notify Sara Andrin at health@myhta.org. Based on the circumstance, you may be asked to keep your child home from school for 14 days. Home-based learning will be provided and supported during self-quarantine.

Please stay home if sick

If your child is sick, we ask that you keep them home from school. They must be fever-free and symptom-free for 24 hours before returning to campus.

Follow temperature checking and self-assessment reporting protocol

Elementary students will receive daily temperature checks on campus. Middle and high school students, faculty and staff will complete daily self-assessments.

COMMUNITY EXPECTATIONS CONTINUED

Avoid non-essential travel

Any student or employee who travels outside Hawai'i will be required to email health@myhta.org or call (808) 676-5444 to notify the school and adhere to state and Department of Health guidelines. Depending on shifting state guidelines, employees or students may be required to self-quarantine for at least 14 calendar days if they cannot produce a negative COVID-19 test that was taken more than four days after their return.

Follow federal, state and local orders related to stopping the spread of COVID-19 All HTA students, families, faculty and staff are asked to follow the latest federal, state and local health departments regarding social distancing and other safety measures to protect against the spread of COVID-19.

Follow guidelines for use of Personal Protective Equipment (PPE) We strongly encourage the entire school community to wear their own PPE. A student, teacher, or parent arriving on campus without PPE will be given a mask or face shield.

Practice good hygiene

Practicing good hygiene in accordance with CDC guidelines is critical to preventing and stopping the spread of COVID-19 and other illnesses. Frequent and thorough hand-washing should be practiced at home and at school.

Limit students' personal items

Please limit the items your child brings to campus and reinforce safety policies about sharing food, supplies and other items with classmates.
